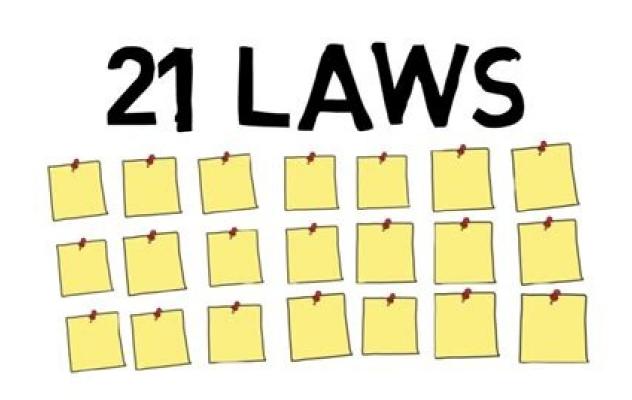
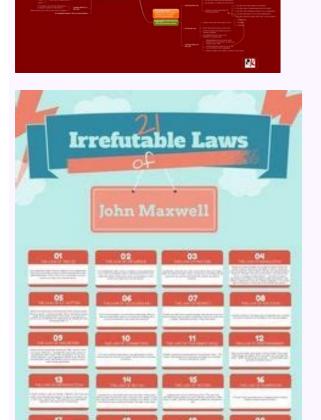

Mill's argument is that the "simple pleasures" tend to be preferred by people who have no experience with high art, and are
therefore not in a proper position to judge. He also argues that people who, for example, are noble or practise philosophy, benefit society more than those who engage in individualist practices for pleasure, which are lower forms of happiness altogether.

He says that "he has not only that virtue must be desired, but must be
disinterested, by himself." [84] in the final chapter of him looks at the connection between utility or not. He scratches this question in several different ways and finally reaches the conclusion that in certain cases justice is essential for utility, but in
others, social duty is much more important than justice. enjoyments."[86] He firmly believed that moral rules and obligations could be referred to promote happiness, which connects to a noble character.
